

CONSTRUCTION ON HOMELANDS IN FOCUS

Annual HMES (Homelands Maintenance and Essential Services) run is going well, with works having occurred at **Wurdeja, Ji-Marda, Buluhkaduru, Bolkdjam, Nardilmuk, Ji-Balbal, Ankababirri**.

Gochan Jiny-Jirra had a catastrophic fire within the power system end of last year, with an emergency grant being submitted and approved for interim system. Temporary system requires refuelling fortnightly. Installation of the new power system should begin by the end of next month.

Mudbrick crew have begun rebuilding BBQ's and outdoor kitchens on various homelands (**Nardilmuk, Rocky Point, Ankababirri**). We are awaiting repairs on Mudbrick Termite machine which will allow the mudbrick crew to increase production from 120 bricks per day, to over 800.

On Sunday the 30th of June, **Chairperson Jacqueline Phillips**, and **Homelands Coordinator Brett Wilbe** attended a full community meeting at Ji-Bena with stakeholders and residents to discuss the **HHIP** project and the ongoing consultation process. The meeting was held for everyone to discuss the project, raise their concerns and ask questions about the building logistics and apprentice participation on the project. After decades of not having a community meeting, it was agreed that these would be held on a regular basis.

We are so happy and proud to work alongside strong cultural leaders and stakeholders that are active in consultation and the infrastructure upgrades to their Homeland.

CULTURAL RESEARCH OFFICE – PRESERVING THE KNOWLEDGE

This month, the **Balkarranga clan** released a clan mapping publication and film, concluding the three-year project funded by the Australian Government's Indigenous Languages and Arts program. Led by key clan members and junggay, the project's aim was to document kin, Country, and culture for future generations. Outcomes for this project include over 10 hours of Martay Burarra recordings, documentation of the **Mun-jiburey manikay** (song cycle), short films featuring bunggul and clan stories, and a 70+ page full-colour publication on the clan's cultural knowledge, kinship, and history. A launch was held at the Maningrida Art Centre featuring a screening of the film and the release of the publication "An-jiburey". Clan members reflected on the project and acknowledged the contributions of everyone who worked tirelessly to bring this project to fruition.

An-jiburey is available to purchase, in limited release, at Maningrida Art Centre.
