Well done **Djelk Rangers**, commended by **Australian Border Force** for reporting a sighting of suspicious fishing boats near Maningrida. Based on this information, the Border Force intercepted two illegal foreign fishing vessels and apprehended 12 crew members in waters off the Northern Territory coast.

ABF vessels subsequently located and intercepted the vessels near Maningrida and Port Essington, Northern Territory on Sunday, 22 February 2025. ABF officers seized a total of 1,200 kilograms of trepang (sea cucumber), valued up to AUD\$12,000, and fishing equipment.

The vessels were seized and destroyed at sea in accordance with Australian law.

In early February, seven senior women artists from Maningrida Arts & Culture presented WERRKNO II, an exhibition of 33 original works on paper at Laundry Gallery in Parap, Garramilla (Darwin), a First Nations-owned Indigenous art gallery based in a beautiful old laundromat. These works were created during the Kurrung build-up season, with storm clouds rumbling and the first rains breaking the heat. Through a week-long workshop facilitated by Ingrid Johanson and generously funded by the Northern Land Council's Indigenous Economic Stimulus Grant and was the second formalised artist development workshop for these artists working with fine art paper. Using natural pigments from the earth ground on paper, and monochromatic mark-making using charcoal and Indian ink the artists have visualised the skin of Namorrorddo, the shooting star spirit that emits rays of white light from their heads and are malevolent in nature, and the eggs of the Djomi, a freshwater fertility spirit with a fish tail, alongside depictions of yams, dillybags, bush medicine plants and fish traps.

The exhibition was opened on Saturday 8 February by Traditional Owner Joy Garlbin, alongside artists Belinda Kernan, Elizabeth Wullunmingu, and Jack Nawilil, to enthusiastic audience. WERRKNO II runs until March 8, with artworks available for purchase online through Laundry Gallery.
