Development Program was launched this year with highly creative results. Artists,
Colin Malbunka, Exance Pareroultja, Voight
Ratara and Andrew Ebatarinja are creating
a body of work inspired by Hermannsburg
artists of the past 30 years, while
developing their own individual style.

The works will feature in the first ever men's exhibition at Alcaston Gallery in December.

Frock On!

Ikuntji Artists' Frock On! project is a stunning contemporary collaboration bringing together Indigenous designed fabric with the sewing community and fashion lovers.

The project is a celebratory event that shines a light on the quality of handprinted fabrics, the artists behind them, the place of slow handmade fashion, the skilled designers and sewers who work with them and everything in between.

Over 28 makers and fabric lovers from around Australia and the USA plus over 70 metres of fabric designed by Ikuntji Artists and hand printed by Publisher Textiles in Sydney, participated.

This project continues to elevate the voice of Aboriginal artists in the fashion industry, creating new bold narratives that are deeply rooted in the culture of place.

Facilitated by Flying Fox Fabrics, the project culminated in an Awards Event featuring hundreds of hours of work and creativity by dozens of people on the runway with six outfits being chosen for the IOTA21 Conference and Fashion Event – **Curiosity and the Cloth**.

A new mural by Iltja Ntjarra artists

Iltja Ntjarra Art Centre teamed up with visiting artist Kaff-eine during the Alice Springs Street Art Festival presented in August by Red Hot Arts.

The contributing artists transferred their traditional Hermannsburg School style to the walls of Mparntwe. In collaboration with Kaff-eine's distinctively animated and cheery characters, the Iltja Ntjarra artists introduced elements of contemporary life with natural landscapes juxtaposed with consumer culture.

"This mural was about welcoming people to come and enjoy our country, spend time here and see the landscape with your own eyes. We like you to take photos but we ask that you leave the country as you found it."

The festival was successful in adding vibrancy and life to the CBD of Mpartnwe/Alice Springs paying homage to the Central Australian landscape and community and creating professional development opportunities for emerging local talent.



Tanya Singer wins this year's Desart Photography Prize



Tanya Singer of Maruku Arts and Crafts has taken out this year's Photography Prize with her work *My Mother's Fayourite Flowers*.

Coby Edgar, Curator of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Art AGNSW, who judged the prize said of the work "the story caught my attention, the focus on the delicate flower being her late mother's favourite and the impact climate change is having in trying to source that flower".

Montana Clause of Martumili Artists was awarded Highly Commended for her portrait of friend Tamisha Williams. Edgar said

"It's such a great example of the relationship between a photographer and a model even though the focus of the work is the earrings".

Edgar's second Highly Commended went to Sonya Murphy of Arlpwe Art and Culture whose untitled work demonstrates the process of jewellery making from a distinct vantage point.

Accepting her award as the overall winner for 2021 Tanya Singer said she was "ecstatic and a little overwhelmed". She said "the Desart Photography Prize opens opportunities in art centres and particularly the young people to broaden their views and present their lives in their way".



Congratulations Grace!

Grace Kemarre Robinya of Tangentyere Artists has won the \$10,000 Vincent Lingiari Art Award for her painting *Raining at Laramba*.

Ms Robinya's painting was one of 26 finalists in this year's prize responding to the theme *Ngawa*, *Ngapa*, *Kapi*, *Kwatja*, *Water*. Artists from across Central Australia reflected on the significance of water for their collective survival on their country.

Raining at Laramba depicts country around Napperby Station, where Ms Robinya and her husband worked and raised their family.

Born in Ntaria in 1942, she is an accomplished figurative painter whose works frequently feature her signature clouds with sheets of rain. Her vibrant works for Tangentyere Artists powerfully evoke important events, locations and contemporary life in the Alice Springs Town camps, where she lives today.

The Central Land Council's Delgate's award this year went to Leah Leaman of Karungkarni Art and Culture Centre, Kalkarindji, for her work *Following the Waterways* which tells the story of a couple, "the last of their kind", who "followed the waterways by foot all the way from here to the coast ..."

The award was presented in partnership with the CLC and Tangentyere Artists; co-curated by curator, and art writer Hetti Perkins and Marisa Maher, curator and assistant manager at the Iltja Ntjarra Many Hands Art Centre in Mparntwe/ Alice Springs and supported by the Peter Kittle Motor Company and Newmont Australia.
